Did You Know?

- The Cason J. Callaway is a bulk carrier ship that has been in operation for several decades.
- Built in 1952, the ship was lengthened by 120 in 1974. Then in 1982, the Cason J. Callaway was converted to a self unloader.
- The Cason J. Callaway was constructed in 1952 by the Great Lakes Engineering Works in River Rouge, Michigan, USA.
- It has served primarily on the Great Lakes, transporting bulk cargo such as iron ore, coal, and limestone.
- The Cason J. Callaway, like many vessels on the Great Lakes, plays a crucial role in the transportation of bulk commodities, supporting industries and infrastructure in the region.
